About Dr. Henton:

Dr. Lynn Henton is a Licensed Psychologist in private practice in the Austin area, providing assessment and therapy services for children, adolescents, and families. In addition, Dr. Henton consults with area school districts and private schools. Previously Dr. Henton directed psychological services at Austin Child Guidance Center.

Dr. Henton earned her Bachelor of Science degree in clinical psychology from Memphis State University. Later, she earned Doctorate in Educational Psychology from the University of Texas School of Psychology.

About Dr. Hoke:

Dr. Julia Hoke is a Licensed Psychologist with experience in the assessment and treatment of children and adolescents with a wide range of learning, emotional, and behavioral difficulties. She earned her Doctorate in Educational Psychology from the University of Texas at Austin. Dr. Hoke also completed her Master's degree and Bachelor's degree at UT-Austin.

Dr. Hoke has worked in area schools and at the Austin Child Guidance Center. She has also served as a clinical supervisor for graduate students in the UT-Austin School Psychology Program and is currently an adjunct professor of school psychology at Texas State University.

Each testing appointment lasts about four hours. A written report and follow-up meeting will be scheduled approximately three weeks after the testing. The Center implements the assessment model used by the Texas Scottish Rite Hospital for Children in Dallas.

“With the implementation of similar testing methods, the Scottish Rite Learning Center will be fully equipped to measure cognitive and academic factors that are key to planning instruction in accordance with criteria contained in the Texas Dyslexia Law,” says Dr. Jeff Black, medical director, Luke Waites Center for Dyslexia and Learning Disorders of the Texas Scottish Rite Hospital for Children in Dallas. “This testing method will, also, enable school districts using the evaluations to become more proactive against dyslexia by implementing the evidence based dyslexia interventions.

Under the Texas Scottish Rite Hospital's assessment model, the Learning Center tests a variety of abilities, including intelligence, oral language, visual and motor performance, phonological processing and academic skills with an emphasis on reading.
